A Complete Curriculum!

The Academy for Writers curriculum is driven by the importance of motivation. When your child has a great story to share, he or she is willing to do the work that writing requires. (See the letter to parents for more about why story is the best engine for literacy.) And by putting those stories on paper, your child's literacy skills improve quickly. Each lively and entertaining video is 5-10 minutes long, with suggested activities to take up another 30 minutes or so. It means you can turn your living room into a classroom situation, and schedule the lessons at your convenience.

Renowned author Sigmund Brouwer uses techniques and ways of sharing his story philosophy that have proven to work for even the most reluctant of writers. He spends the first seven lessons (Section 1) sharing with your child the power of story challenging them to become Story Ninjas — and shows them the secrets of developing a great story. The next seven lessons (Section 2) move on to ways to make writing better so that the reader will enjoy the story even more. After that, seven lessons (Section 3) on editing and revising.

When your child competes all of the first 21 lessons (Story Ninja moves), he or she is invited to apply all of the fun knowledge to the writing of a story. In the next seven lessons (Section 4), Sigmund guides them through the process to a single polished story that you and your child can celebrate.

The final seven lessons (Section 5) show your child how to use all of the skills and confidence to complete a wonderful memoir story based on an interview with a grandparent.
